Torchlight procession leaves the Village Hall at 6.45pm.


For safety reasons, an approved traffic management company will close the High Street to traffic between 6.45 and 7.15pm.

Weather Report Rainfall

September was widely reported as being the driest for 100 years. My records for Stillington do not go back that far but it was certainly the driest I have recorded. At 17mm it was less than a third of the average figure. It may have been dry but it was not sunny. The output of my solar panels was the lowest since February!

Normal rainfall has been resumed in October with 35mm in the first sixteen days.

Temperature

Temperatures in September did not again reach the 25.7° C attained on the 5^{th} of the month. However the latter part of the month was mild, with day-time temperatures mostly reaching the low 20's. The coldest night of the month was the $26^{th}/27^{th}$ when it fell to 6.2° C.

October started mild but then temperatures fell sharply. On the 14th the day-time temperature only reached 13.1°C. *MT*

Halloween and 'trick or treating'

Most people are happy to hand over sweets or biscuits to children who are having fun. However, occasionally things can go too far with threats of vandalism such as 'egg and flouring' the house or worse. So some residents might not want to answer the door at this time of year.

We have some posters you can use to show your preferences. They also have some useful advice on the back:

- No trick or treaters A4
- No trick or treaters A5
- Trick or treaters welcome A4
- Trick or treaters welcome A5

If you are going trick or treating:

- Children aged 10 years or younger should be accompanied by an adult.
- Wear light coloured clothing or something reflective. Have a torch or light stick with you and leave them switched on.
- If your children are going trick or treating without you, make sure they tell you where they are going and that a responsible member of the group has your phone number.
- Never enter anyone's house unless you know them well, are comfortable doing so and they have invited you into their home.
- Never ask for money.
- Trick or treating should end at about 9:30 p.m. Don't ring doorbells after that time.
- Even if lights are on, don't ring anyone's doorbell more than twice.
- Always use the front door never go to the back of a house.
- Don't walk across lawns and gardens use the path to the front door and respect other people's property.
- Always be polite and remember to say thank you!



In the Countryside

Monday, 20th October has dawned rather grey with many leaves still on the trees. This month has been another wonderful time of fine mild, dry days - many of which were still and sunny. The autumn work on the farm has gone on wonderfully well with seed planted into good seedbeds, even if a little dry.

Some oilseed rape crops have suffered with the ravages of flea beetles. These tiny little beetles jump around on the bare ground eating emerging leaves leaving some plants with many holes in the leaf and totally eliminating others. In a heavy infestation the ground shimmers with these hungry insects. They were the cause of much crop failure in the turnip/swede fields of our fathers

before DDT was invented. Since, seed dressings have dealt with the problem. However, some chemicals have been removed from the market and the little beggars are back this year and, down south, some farmers have lost 25% of their crop. The grass is still growing vigorously and the sheep are feeding well on it setting them up well for the winter months.

Yesterday, we picked apples to store for winter use. We find that they keep well if they are stored cool and frost-free in

our outbuildings. There is a good crop with wonderful colour as they have ripened in the sunshine to gold and rosy red. The forklift is a vast improvement on the old ladders on the high trees - and much safer.

Saturday, we were at the Countryside Live Event at the Yorkshire Show Ground. There were several Red Kites about; it always amazes me how they seem oblivious to crowds of people and vehicles. Recently, I saw one flying low and the sun on its back revealed a red colouring on the upper rump of the bird. In a falconry display, a barn owl was mobbed by five or six carrion

crows but took little notice of them and remained obedient to its handler. Later a larger harris hawk was released and the crows soon disappeared. I wonder why?

We had a goldcrest feeding on the cotoneaster busily hopping around after tiny insects. The last swallows have only just gone they being the youngsters from a final brood, who, with the good weather will have got well fuelled up with fat reserves for a long overseas haul. One bird goes - others just arrive. There are more jays this year about than usual I think. Some birds will be indigenous but more will have come from the continent to consume a good crop of acorns. One jay landed just a few yards from the wagon in the yard where I was having a lazy moment. So I enjoyed having a close look at this colourful member of the crow family, corvidae being the proper title for them. These buff

> brown birds with stiffer bills than other crows and speckled foreheads with an unmistakeable white rump seen at best in its undulating flight and of course the sky-blue black spotted feathers in the wings, that have often adorned the trilby hat of

years past.

Recently at Morrison's Supermarket in York, a young tree's branches were whited with what look like lichen; on closer looks it was bird droppings so I guess that a goodly group of wagtails

were roosting there. Wagtail seem to like the bright lights of city life for their night life. The pied wagtail numbers seem to be on the increase by what I see in the fields. We have a grey wagtail about the yard at the moment - they have yellow bellies and grey upper parts and, like other wagtails, are rather smart.

There is a vast array of wonderfully coloured trees about at the moment to enjoy visually, along with a rich variety of cloud colours, rainbows and amazing sunsets all there for the eye that sees. Enjoy.

Common Land on the South Side of Newton House, York Road Stillington

There was no further news from The Land Registry Tribunal on our application and their decision is still awaited. It is hoped that a decision will be forthcoming in the near future.

Fairview High Street Stillington

A formal planning application has been submitted.

Painting of the White Fences

The paintings of the fences are expected to be completed by the end of this week.

Stillington Village Signs

It was agreed to delay a decision on the renewal of the signs until the November meeting.

Hedges around the Churchyard

Action is in hand to cut the hedges around the Church. This will be completed in October.

Yellow Lines Outside the School

The information given by NYCC to the Parish Council regarding the date of 6 September when the Yellow lines were to be repainted was incorrect. NYCC have now confirmed that the school lining works are currently on hold while an amended Traffic Regulation Order is granted. It is not known when this will be granted.

Mobile Telephone Mast

There was no further progress on this to assist the Harlequin Group. It was agreed to re-visit, and to identify other possible sites in the village and surrounding areas.

2 It's time to look at the Future Use of our Village Sports and Social Club

Cricket has been played in Stillington since the 1880s and Football from the early 1900s.

But it wasn't until 1959 and 1961 that land was purchased to enable both sports to be played on the same site and the Stillington Playing Fields charity was established. A wooden ex-RAF building became the first Social Hall, Bar and changing rooms; extensions in the 1970s provided a brick built bar, lounge, wider hall and new changing rooms.

Both the outdoor and indoor facilities have been managed and maintained more or less entirely by volunteers throughout this time. Bar stewards have been employed to help run the bar until just recently.

We now need to look at possibly different ways to use and manage the facilities for the next generation.

- The Club has an idyllic setting within a woodland belt on the edge of the village
- Safe car parking is available
- Children's Play Area is being refurbished
- How best to use and manage the indoor facilities?

Stillington Gardening Club

- 24th September Ray Creek - Orchids

I cannot have been the only listener at Ray Creek's excellent talk to think sadly of the various orchids I have killed with a mixture of over-watering, over-feeding and ignorance.

We learnt that there are some 20,000 wild species of orchids, spread from the tropics to the arctic.

They are not soil growers, preferring to grow in the fork of a tree with their roots hanging free to gather moisture from which they gather their own food. So stop packing their pots with compost and just wet those roots (preferably with tap water) every few weeks.

But they do need light. So if yours like mine have started to drop their flowers it is because of our shorter hours of daylight. Hang on till Spring and it will recover.

Every three years or so they will need a bit of fresh coconut husk compost and any dodgy bits of root removing. But on the whole we were urged to neglect them more, keep them cool but not cold, and just to enjoy them.
