Weather Report

In July the rainfall finally amounted to 57mm, a little below the long term average of 67mm. The longest rain-free spell was five days. Statistically August is the wettest month and this year, so far, is no exception, with 72mm in the first sixteen days.

Temperature

July may not have been exceptionally dry but it was warm and sunny. We cannot complain this year of "having had no summer". The maximum daytime temperature never fell below 20°C and on four consecutive days (24th to 26th) it exceeded 30°C in my garden. After the first of the month, night-time temperatures never fell below 10°C and on the night of 19th/20th the minimum was over 18°C, a very warm night.

August started off in the same vein but then a cold front came in and recent temperatures have been rather below average.

In the Countryside

Tonight, 19th August, the late evening sun has been very bright in a sky full of large clouds, some looking like they are full of water. The sun cast a wonderful golden glow on to the land - stubble fields were a mix of gold and dark cloud shadows whereas the trunks of the trees in the conifer wood were a reddish bright brown and the foliage a very dark green making an amazing colour contrast. This afternoon, there were two kestrels riding the thermals - not a sight I have seen before. I watched for a while wondering if they were indeed kestrels, then one went into hovermode so typical of kestrels.

Last week I was in the yard when I heard a raptor call out - not a

cry which I had heard before but typical of raptors. Upon looking up, a peregrine falcon was just idly gliding by with wings folded well back like a fighter jet aircraft. Suddenly, it accelerated and a cloud of swallows that had been hanging around dived in all directions from this alien visitor. In a moment it was beyond the farm buildings and trees and lost from sight. A peregrine is the fastest

bird in the world and can attain speeds of up to 180 mph in a stoop to its prey. Like most fast predators, they do the speed thing in short bursts then need a rest. Raptors use a lot of energy in hunting so they try and conserve energy as best they can. Buzzards will ride thermals with ease and watchful eye. Other raptors will have a vantage point from where they watch for opportunities. A kestrel will just lazily fly and pause to hover if anything catches its eye.

The hot weather has helped in the making of good hay if the cutting was done at the right time, but there have been a goodly number of heavy showers to complicate the whole process. The weathermen have not been too accurate either during this last month or so. The hot weather has ripened the cereal crops a little too quickly so much corn has died rather than ripened which leads to smaller grains and less tonnage of grain. However, much grain and oilseed rape have come in at record low moisture content. Grain is sold with a maximum moisture content and price deductions for any above the maximum, but there is no increase for grain below that maximum. Oilseed rape has been so dry that some seed will not be crushable until the moisture content rises, yet another problem to be overcome. Must not grumble - grain

too dry is better than too wet when oil used for drying is so expensive.

Our apple trees have a reasonable crop this year and have grown an awful lot since we had showers; up until then, they looked a very poor sample. The blackberries are ripening in profusion on our cultivated ones which have yielded unfailingly over the years we have been here. Last month's edition was only just written

when we had a visit from a kingfisher to our pond near the house. It is always amazing how fast they fly and how such an amazingly bright bird can blend into background greens.

Now as the season's wheel turns, the robin is back into the building singing after spending the lazy, hazy days of summer in the open fields and woods. They are one of the first birds to tell autumn is here with all its colours to come and beautiful fungi to watch out for.
