School News

A new year has started, and we are now back in the swing of things. Nine children have joined us, with six in the Reception class, and are all settling in well.

Body Beautiful! This term's topic in the Junior Class is about the human body. We started with bone structure and the children had great fun creating their own skeleton from sticks they had gathered. The advantage of learning about the human body is a ready resource to hand. The children have been feeling their own ribs and hip bones, searching for the twenty-six bones in their hands and the twenty-seven in their feet. Did you know that there are over 200 bones in the adult human skeleton with the largest bone being the femur and the smallest being the three ossicles in the middle ear which just about cover the centre on a 1p piece?

Wraparound care: The school offers morning (7:30 - 8:50) and afternoon care (3:15 - 6:00) to help working parents as well as a range of clubs. This half-term the clubs are gardening, with a focus on gardening for wildlife, and multi-sports.

Infant RE: This term's RE topic is 'belonging'. The children have brought photographs of themselves at clubs and groups they belong to outside of school. They've been thinking about how we can belong to more than one group and how sharing common interests, and beliefs, are an important part of belonging.

Countryside notes

Tuesday 18th September another beautiful day with a bit of breeze. However, Thursday is forecast to be very wet so we will wait and see. The land is still very dry even though we have had a number of showers that have lived the grass up.

This afternoon I have been working in the pond spraying Bull Rush, Flag Iris and Bog Bean. There is some water in the centre and an awful lot of silt that could do with removing (I think that will stay a little longer). Years ago I cleared it out with the tractor but now our access has been absorbed into the garden. I sprayed a lot of Bogbean about 6 weeks ago and I was able to walk on the mat of dying weed. However, I went through the mat with my left foot and then had an awful job getting it out. I thought of the poem 'Father William "do you think at your age"'. It is remarkable how the trees have taken up the water reserves from deep down. One grass field of sandy soil the grass has not grown for 30 or 40 feet from the hungry, thirsty root systems of Ash and Oak and remains as brown as a berry. Where further out into the field good new green grass is growing, taking up a late application of nitrogenous fertiliser.

The autumn colours are just starting their wonderful fashion Parade that we all look forward to seeing in full knowledge that dark nights and winter is following close behind. Recently I pinched some Hop Vines from the hedgerow, they are only a wild variety but they have produced a big crop of fruits if that is the correct term. We will use them as decoration in the house, I have never seen them crop so heavily. One vine had wrapped around a fruitful brunch of Guelder Rose with the translucent red shining berries and leaves changing to red, along with lemony green hops and dark green hop leaves, it was a thing of exquisite beauty.

The season has got a little mixed this year. One friend whose strawberries were moderate in summer are producing some fine fruit now, some flowers in the garden are having a second fling and the swallows that were late arriving have departed early without mass gatherings on vines overhead. I hope they have fledged well this year.

The bird feeders are busy with 2 woodpeckers this morning feeding with watchful eyes, the Robin is singing as it claims its territory for the winter and the spring ahead, Enjoy this 'Season of Mists and mellow Fruitfulness'.

Stillington Bonfire – Saturday 3rd November

This year's bonfire will be held on Saturday 3rd November in the field to the south of the Sports and Social Club. The torchlight procession leaves the Village Hall at 6.45pm. For safety reasons, an approved traffic management company will close the High Street to traffic between 6.45 and 7.15pm. The bonfire will be lit when the procession reaches the field. Fireworks commence at 7.30pm, and food and soft drinks will be available as usual. Boots or wellies are recommended footwear. Please note that for safety reasons, private fireworks and sparklers are not allowed on the field. Tickets can be purchased at the gate. To save money, get your tickets in advance at the Post Office before the event (available from 20 October).

Stillington and District Community Archive

As part of the Armistice Centenary Commemoration your village archive will be putting on an exhibition of all the material we have on the men and women who served their country during WW1. This has really been an event ten years in the making as one of our very first big projects was to research the thirteen men on our village war memorial. There were also some additional men who could well have been included on our memorial but for some reason were not. We then turned to the men who made it home, not such an easy task as many records were destroyed in air raids during WW2. Recently material has been issued on nurses and orderlies which has led to more discoveries. In all we have the histories of nearly one hundred individuals who served on all fronts of the war, along with photographs, war diary extracts, medal cards, letters and service records. And we will also be revealing the story of 'Lightning', Stillington's very own war horse!

The exhibition will open on Friday 9th November with a preview event £5 per ticket with wine and nibbles opening at 7:30 in the Village Hall, continuing on Saturday (11-4) and Sunday (2-4).

CPR & DEFIBRILLATOR DEMONSTRATION

On the 30th August, Stillington Parish Council put on a demonstration in the Village Hall showing how to apply CPR and how to use the defibrillator in an emergency. Stillington Wanderers

2018's summer heat has meant a shorter season for moorland heather & walkers were lucky to catch last blooms on Bank Holiday 27 August, north of Helmsley along East Moor Wood and Cowhouse Bank. There was however a colourful array of beehives after Potter House and it was pheasants galore driving up Baxton Strip road.

An unusual crop for our area, thought to be soya, was spotted near Sheriff Hutton Hall on 10 September walk. Then plenty of race horse activity via Sheepclose, Wheatclose and New House farms including the synthetic exercise tracks and then back alongside the ruined towers of Sheriff Hutton castle.

Weather Report September 2018

Rainfall: The second half of August was even drier than the first, so the total for the month, of 37mm, was well below the average figure of 83mm.

In the first half of September the rainfall (19mm) has again been below average, with the only heavy rain being on Saturday the 8th (12mm).

Temperature: The temperature in the latter part of August never reached the highs of the first week. 26.4°C, on the 5th, remained the highest temperature of the month. The lowest temperature occurred right at the end of the month, with 7.0°C on the night of 30th/31st.

Sunshine in August was disappointing, at 390kWh the lowest August figure for three years.

Temperatures in the first half of September have held up well. The highest was 26.0 °C on the 2nd. Most nights have been mild, usually above 10°C, but there was a chill on the night of 6th/7th, when it fell to 6.5°C.

With the 2019 bowling season already being planned, the clubs players are now looking forward to a well earned rest.

Harvest...?

At this time of year many will celebrate a Harvest Festival, these are times, rightly, when we give thanks for the providence of God and for all that the planet we inhabit affords us. This year we have been starkly reminded of the fragility of this world we call home. We froze in the spring battered by the Beast from the East, and we sweltered through a long and very hot summer, if we look further back we would remember that the autumn of 2017 was a very wet one. Why you may ask am I giving you a recap of the weather. For many farmers the weather has made this year a challenging one. For sheep farmers the problems began in the autumn of 2017 when prolonged cold and damp affected ewe fertility. The snow and cold temperatures of the 'Beast from the East' arrived at lambing time and there were losses of new lambs and ewes as well as cattle resulting in cash flow problems with fewer lambs to sell in the autumn and higher prices for replacement ewes. The prolonged drought in some areas has meant that farmers are now feeding their livestock with forage made for the winter months as there isn't enough nutritious grass. Many will not have been able to produce as much silage as normal and this, coupled with early feeding, may well lead to shortages and higher prices. This may result in further problems when hay/silage stocks run out before the winter is over causing more stress and financial pressures. In the arable sector, the cold spring meant that some crops were sown late and established crops had their growth affected. Many crops have being harvested early but lack of water meant that yields may be low. This should make us sit up straight and perhaps mutter under our breath 'Oh my' as we fully take on board the implications for us all. At this year's Lammas Service held at St. Leonard's Farlington we were asked to hold our farmers in prayer in these testing times when anxieties are high. I am using this letter to ask a wider population to do the same, to pray for our farming community. We can, of course still give thanks for food but recognise the extra work and stress this year has caused and the fact that some of the effects will continue into next year and beyond. They are 'not out of the woods' and need our support and encouragement, they are after all our custodians of the land and they do a great job in providing food for our tables. The food for which we are grateful, so much so we celebrate with our annual Harvest Festivals – do celebrate, do give thanks; and praise God that we are blessed with what we have and ask for God's blessing on all those who play their part in our food production.
