## Countryside Notes

Wednesday 22nd August, another sticky, muggy day with the odd shower, which has been rather typical since last I wrote. The showers have been welcome in the crops and grass growing in field and garden but have left the combine on stop and start progress and the farmer scratching his head; do I harvest at 18% moisture content and have to dry the corn down to 14 or 15% moisture at a cost or wait for the sun to shine. Cereal prices have risen substantially in recent days as yields have been forecast down in many parts of the world and especially in the EU. The price of straw has also risen dramatically because of the lack of growth with the drought, so a lower yield of straw, exacerbated by the purchasing of straw for Biomass for burning at Power Stations and Aerobic Digester Plants, while livestock farmers need straw for bedding and feed. These shortages of grain will lead to price rises for our food but the real impact will be borne by the Hungry of our World.



The lawn mower is back in work again as the showers have activated the brown turf and grass is fairly resilient. We have a patch that will need a re-seed very near the house, after Badgers have been busy scratching turf up. Perhaps they have been after worms that had come up because we had watered that area, or they had been digging up ants that were active in that area. We were pleased to see a Hedgehog on the road in Parkfield a fortnight ago, as we have not seen one at home for a few years. Unfortunately, I have seen two road victims in as many days. I wonder if they are like many of our birds and animals searching for water in the welcome puddles on our poorly maintained roads and therefore becoming vulnerable to road traffic.

Today, I need some Rat Poison and went to purchase some. I know that I need to pass a test and gain a certificate to buy a quantity (a small amount can be bought without a Certificate of Competence) but I am informed that this small quantity is going to be reduced by 50% in strength. We have been advised at every turn to feed plenty for a full course or we will consequently get Resistant Rats that poison will not touch. Our advisors need to rethink!!

Butterflies have not, so far, been in strong numerical evidence this year. Hopefully, later broods will be more successful. I wonder if over-wintering eggs and hibernating adults have been victims of the Beast from the East, followed by the lack of tender foliage for hungry caterpillars. However, the first Painted Lady was at the Buddleia yesterday. Earlier in the month we spotted a large moth in our dining room. I had to get the book out to identify it and it proved to be a Red Underwing, a moth that has moved north with our warming climate. The brown and buff upper front wings were marbled like the book binding of old books, the underwings bright orangey red with two broad brown stripes, the wing edges painted like a pair of pinking scissors had been used. Our early flowering Honeysuckle berries have been eaten by garden birds and by Chiff Chaff, Warblers, Blackcaps and young Bullfinches (which are just starting to get a pink flush as their more mature feathers grow). Whilst at the feeder a Marsh or Willow Tit was enjoying peanuts. I was unable to identify them correctly, both having black heads but one species is more shiny than the other.

The fruit in the orchard is ripening much to the delight of the wasps. The churches in Stillington are holding an Apple Fest on the 20th October to celebrate the apple in all or some of its glory in a meal of apples. Enjoy ripening fruit and celebrate with us.

### What's with all the fish?

In the June Stillington News there was an appeal in the name of St Nicholas' Church for wooden fish shapes to be purchased and decorated "to help repair our church tower". By the look of the railings in front of the church there has been a good response. But why does the church need a to make repairs to the tower?

Every five years the church is required to employ an approved architect to make a thorough inspection of the fabric and fittings. This is known as a "Quinquennial Inspection". Following this, the architect sends us a comprehensive report (a copy of which can be viewed in church) with a list of recommendations which the congregation are expected to implement. There is no national fund to meet the cost. There are some charities which may or may not contribute towards the cost, but the onus of finding the money lies with the church members.

So what needs doing and what will it cost? Near the top of the tower there are gaps between some of the stones where there should be mortar. It is not unsafe at present but will become worse if not repaired. It may sound like a relatively small job but consider the location. The work is specialised, and stonemasons are few and far between – and expensive. The correct mix must be used for historic stonework and scaffolding will be needed to gain access. There is also quite a large amount of badly eroded stone on other parts of the tower – on the north side and around the bell chamber – which is worth dealing with whilst the scaffolding is in place. We have had an estimate of the cost and it exceeds £30,000.

A stonemason will not be available before next summer, so we have time to save up. The church is not only the largest building in the village but is by far the oldest and in a very prominent location. It seems likely that some residents, even if they are not regular worshippers, would want to see the building kept in a state of good repair. Hence the fish; and there will no doubt be other fund-raising events and appeals over the coming year.

### Weather Report

#### **Rainfall**

No sooner than my report went to press last month than the rain came – thankfully. By the end of July, the zero for the first half had turned into 48 mm for the month. So, both June and July received above two thirds of their average rainfall. Yet there was a seven-week drought in the middle. Statistics can deceive!

Rainfall in the first half of August has amounted to 31.5mm, less than half the average.

#### **Temperature**

June's heat wave continued into July. Daytime temperatures reached above 20°C for the whole month and touched 30°C on the 26th. It was not until 9th August that the temperature failed to reach 20°C. That same night the night-time temperature fell below 10°C for the first time since June 24th. Many nights in July and the first week of August were uncomfortably warm, the temperature not falling below 18°C on three nights.

The solar output in July equalled the 520kWh of June but was still below that in May.
