We have just welcomed back the playgroup children after the Christmas holidays, they had a wonderful time just before the Christmas break making Christmas cakes to take home and visiting Father Christmas at Piglets!

This term we will be looking at the weather and the cold. We will find out which animals live in cold climates and we have some fantastic arctic animal Duplo and arctic animal figures for the children to play with. We plan to make ice cubes of different sizes to experiment with. The children will be able to see how water freezes and melts, they will choose objects to freeze inside the ice and be able watch it melt away again. They will be able to see how bigger ice cubes melt slower than small ones and share their ideas of why that might be.

We have had an idea from a child for some yellow playdoh to play with, so to expand on this we will make some blue playdoh too and the children will be able to see what colour they can make when they mix the two together!

If you would like to come to playgroup with your child to see what we do you are most welcome to visit - please give Vivienne Cooper the Playgroup Manager a call to arrange. We run a free stay and play session on Thursday mornings from 9.30 – 10.30 with a snack provided for all children.

Neighbourhood Watch

What to do if you're going away over Christmas or New Year: Double check windows and doors are locked before leaving. Never advertise on social media that you are away. Ask a trusted person to look after your home by pulling the curtains at night and putting your bin out on collection day, reminding them to put the bin back after the rubbish has been collected. Invite neighbours to use empty drives. Light up your living room using timer switch. A TV simulator can also be used to make give the appearance of a TV screen being used. Lock your garden gates and side entrances. Don't leave tools lying around in the garden which could be used to break into your home. Please advise the police on 101 if you see any suspicious person / vehicle : call 999 in an emergency and if anyone is in danger.

Reference C.I.L Community Infrastructure Levy Spending

Hi All, We now have an opportunity to finance a number of projects that would help the Community in our Parish. The intention is to extend the infrastructure to the Good of the Community. The spectrum of spending appears to be quite wide.

At present the amount available is £5777.48. This can be split into small amounts. The path to this money is by sending an outline of a Concept or Project to the Parish Council for their consideration.

The levy is intended to focus on the provision of new infrastructure and should not be used to remedy pre-existing deficiencies in infrastructure provision unless those deficiencies will be made more severe by new development.

May I ask you to help us with the distribution of the C.I.L money. If you have a Project you would like to have installed or constructed.

Countryside Notes

Sunday 9th December, I am writing this on a night when a fine Sickle New Moon is shining after a clear bright day and impending frost for tonight. By the time you are reading this, you will have digested your Christmas Dinner, had your New Year Parties and commencing 2019 with a, hopefully, clearer Brexit view.

At last we have had a few wet days and I can't say I enjoyed them too much. However, wild fowl will be rejoicing in pockets of flood water along the rivers. At Newton on Ouse, some swans were flying in the distance looking so pure white against a deep blue sky and a small skein of geese were inspecting the wet wings with an excited chorus. Fencing (the sort only shepherds know) on Friday at Wigginton, a pond was alive with Teal ducks who were whistling and splashing around with glee. These little ducks are very fast fliers and explode into flight when disturbed, hence the term Springing Teal. They are fairly gregarious at this time of year and can be seen in their 100s if you are in the right place.

Last week at about dusk, I was near the churchyard when a Mistle Thrush was singing away in the trees, black clouds were looming and I suppose it was living up to its local name of Storm Cock. These thrushes which have some lighter coloured feathers in their tail and are larger than the Song Thrush are one of our earlier nesting birds, making a nest in the fork of a tree in February which is good to see and so are prone to predation, but they fiercely protect their nest against intruders.

The rams have been turned among the ewes a couple of weeks ago. Two went to one flock, the ewes saw the lorry coming along the road and some that have been with us a few years know that the lorry means gather up is imminent and so flocked at the farthest point in the field. The two rams walked into the field, the old girls watched, then recognised and came running to see what the boys were like this year, so I left them to get on with the job in hand. This is the time of year when we move sheep around a lot as grass gets eaten fairly quickly before they come home for winter feeding. This geriatric and old dog have managed very well to pen and load sheep in field gateways. Meg is slowing in speed but thinking a lot more, even if her thoughts are not always my thoughts. However, the Softly! Softly! approach is working well and the job gets done. 180 lambs that had not been penned in a field before were corralled in half an hour; just me and my dog. Good Dog!

Did you find holly berries this year? For some reason our holly was wonderfully endowed in early November. Then, before the month was out it had all gone. I wonder if the hot summer and mild autumn had ripened them sooner and thus making them sweeter and so much more appealing to the birds. This year has been a good berry year generally but most berries have already gone down red lanes. How the seasons move on, each one with its own appeal for us to enjoy. May you enjoy another year of looking at what is so wonderful and is free.
