Stillington Bonfire - Saturday 9th

This year's bonfire will be held on Saturday 9th November in the field to the south of the Sports and Social Club. **The torchlight procession leaves the Village Hall at 6.45pm.** For safety reasons, an approved traffic management company will close the High Street to traffic between 6.45 and 7.15pm. **The bonfire will be lit when the procession reaches the field. The firework display is provided by a professional contractor this year, commencing at 7.30pm.**

Boots or wellies are recommended footwear. Please note that for safety reasons, private fireworks and sparklers are not allowed on the field.

Entry will be free for children of school age and below. Adults will pay £5 on the night or £4 for advance tickets, which are available from the post office.

Tractors will collect material suitable for burning from around the village between 9am and noon on the day of the bonfire, in the usual way. If you have a large amount of material, please call Andy on 810598 so we can consider collecting it early. Please note we will not take mattresses or plastics.

As you may know the Governors of Stillington School have asked the Local Authority to consider the closure of this precious village resource. Parents, Friends and Supporters of the school believe that the good work our Primary School does far outweighs the negative points that have been highlighted as reasons to close it doors after 112 years of educating local children. As a community everyone in Stillington should be concerned about the implications of shutting down this vital village asset. The greatest concern being if we lose this service, so soon after losing the preschool, would this lead to the loss of other services within the village? A few years ago a group of people, with the backing of the community, fought hard to save our Post Office and store because they recognised that it was essential to preserve it for the good of the village, for everyone in the village whether they wished to use it or not . **Is the school any less important because some people in the village have chosen not to use it? We are calling on you, the community, to help save your school. Lend your voice to ours and sign our petition today.**

Stillington Community Primary School

– A Message from the Governors

I am sure that most of you will be aware by now that the school's governing body wrote to North Yorkshire's Director of the Children and Young People's Service, Stuart Carlton, in September to request that the County Council begin consulting on a proposal to close the school at the end of the current academic year.

Stillington School first went into special measures in 2016; an academy sponsor identified by the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC) declined to take the school on and continuing difficulties have led to a second special measures Ofsted judgement. It now seems extremely unlikely that the RSC will be able to identify a willing sponsor. There are currently 19 children on roll. We feel, at this point that we have exhausted all options open to us as a Governing Board which could secure the future of the school,

Stuart Carlton said the governing body's decision was incredibly sad, but taken in the best interests of the school's current children. He said, "We know that village schools are very dear to their communities and play a crucial role. We are very committed to their support and always go the extra mile to seek solutions to keep them going.

"This decision to seek consultation will come as a blow to families with children at the school as they are committed and loyal. But with no academy sponsor and the fact some village parents choose to send their children elsewhere, it is difficult to see a viable long-term future for the school.

"It is likely that approval to consult on closure at the end of the school year will be decided by the Executive Member in October. "Should the consultation be approved there will be opportunity for stakeholders to express their views on the overall situation as part of the required process and before any final decision is taken."

Since the Governing Board's decision, the school have had many messages of support from the community, for which I would like to sincerely thank you.

Hi Everyone

We thought an update to **Heating Oil Cooperative Members** would be helpful as we head into winter and start thinking of switching the heating on, if we've not done so already. We have enjoyed relatively stable prices during the summer period, with a median price of between 45 and 46p, but this came to an abrupt end after the wholesale price jumped sharply in mid-September after the attacks on the Saudi refineries. The price has been falling steadily since then and by the beginning of the month the Syndicate price had dropped back to **47.87p per litre + VAT for standard kerosene.**

You may recall that in our arrangement with Tate Oil, we agreed that we would only place orders during the period January to November, to assist Tate by avoiding their busiest month, December. Orders can be placed right up to **30th November**, and will be delivered within the usual ten working day target at the discounted Cooperative rates. If you cannot avoid ordering in December for delivery the same month, it will be charged at the prevailing market rate, however orders placed in December for January delivery will be accepted at the usual rate (but you must make it clear when placing the order, that it is for January not December delivery). **You might want to check your tank and see if you need to order in the next eight weeks to see you through until next year.....!!**

November Tips for the Garden:

1. Plant bare-root and container-grown trees and hedging plants.

Stillington Weather - October 2019

Rainfall

After a dry middle of the month, with no rain on eleven consecutive days, September proved very wet overall. The total was 103 mm, 72% up on the average figure.

The first half of October has continued wet, with rainfall in the first sixteen days already exceeding the usual monthly total.

Temperature

The highest September temperature was only 22.8°C (on the 21st), while the lowest was 5.7°C (on the 17/18th).

Sunshine in September generated 360kWh, more than in either of the last two years.

So far, October has only exceeded 15°C on one day, 15.3°C on the 8th, while the lowest temperature has been a chilly 3.6°C on the 2nd/3rd.

Countryside Notes November 2019

Wednesday 16th October, another day with a wet morning turning fine in the afternoon. At last we have a pond with water in it and Mallard ducks have been for a swim. The recent rains of this month have been much needed but, dare I say it, we want some dry weather for the sowing of Winter Corn now. We farmers are never satisfied are we? The first heavy rain at the end of September came only 2 days after I had moved 99 ewes from Haxby to Ings land at Linton on Ouse, on the third day the land flooded, so the sheep had to be moved in a hurry on the Sunday afternoon. They were to get through three areas of flood. I was wading above welly boot tops and up to my thighs with long grass at the bottom; poor Meg had to swim a fair bit. The hard part of it all was getting the sheep into the water each time. They were unwilling to be Conscripts and would not be Volunteers. However, with 3 men and a dog, we got them moving each time. On the biggest and deepest area they had to swim 100 yards. Once they decided to go, they swam at a good pace in a long line. I would have liked a photo! At last, 99 were safe and well washed and they have been none the worse for their ordeal. Shepherd was a little leg weary and hungry but I did think about the poem 'Father William' - "do you think at my age it is right?" Whilst we worked, wild ducks were having a great time, feasting on drowned worms and enjoying water sports!

We have had a wonderful crop of Pears this year. There were lovely big juicy sweet pears early in September, the ones you suck rather than bite and eat outside so the sticky sweet juice doesn't make a mess. Some other large pears of a culinary type are right to eat now, even though they have a tang among the sugar. Others are stored away, still hard and needing to ripen further. Pears are not easy to know when to gather and are sweetest when about to go rotten; so you have to watch them carefully.

This autumn, we have not had as many geese about on the stubble as we have had over recent years. They were getting to be a little too numerous. But I like to hear and see them on their evening flight; it stirs something primeval in the core of my being, perhaps the Hunter Gatherer.

Recently, passing Skipwith Common, we saw an albino grey squirrel gathering acorns for winter feed. Now, I haven't heard of too many of them being about. Some would say it is still a fluffy rat.

The autumnal colours are about this month and will last, hopefully, for a good period and I expect the Oaks will be good into December as they are very green at the moment. They, like many other trees, have been very fruitful this year. There are masses of large acorns which will make winter feed for much wildlife. There is much to enjoy, even though the days are shortening and that is not pleasing to so many. So, enjoy the days as they come, watch the change and don't wake up and say I didn't see it happen.

FRIENDS OF ST MONICA'S HOSPITAL UPDATE

Friends of St. Monica's Hospital is expanding its work. In the past the Friends has raised funds to improve the amenities for patients in the hospital, the latest being new televisions. Following consultation, the Friends will now be able to work in our communities to improve the health and welfare of residents. We have recently teamed up with Easingwold District Community Care Association to provide transport for cancer sufferers who attend St James's Hospital in Leeds for treatment. Trustees are now considering other proposals for future work.
