News from Stillington Surgery

This year we are trialling a new system for annual reviews starting with our diabetes patients. Our aim is to complete all our diabetes annual reviews through the summer months (April – October) and then do the shorter review through winter when the surgery is generally busier.

For patients whose birthdays fall between April and September, we request that you book an appointment for the month of your birthday. For those with birthdays from October through to March please book 6 months before your birthday. For example, birthdays in October would book an appointment in April, birthdays in November would book in May, December in June, etc.

This may result in you having your review sooner than you usually would this year but in the longer term we hope that it will help to balance the workload of the Surgery and will encourage more patients to proactively book their appointment. We will still remind those who do not book in and would like to expand our use of text messaging for this purpose. Please therefore ensure that we have your current mobile number and your consent for text messaging on our records.

Dill

Dill's delicately flavoured leaves and caraway flavoured seeds are both used in culinary dishes. Dill seeds are often an ingredient in pickles, especially pickled cucumbers and in cabbage dishes such as sauerkraut and coleslaw. Dill leaves, with a clean, refreshing flavour, are often added to cut through sour cream and yoghurt. One of dill's best known uses is in gravadlax, made by marinating fresh salmon with salt, sugar, pepper and finely chopped dill leaves. It is also used in many fish dishes.

Tips for the Garden - JUNE

1. Start planting out summer bedding towards the end of the month.
2. Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds.
3. Be water-wise, especially in drought-affected areas.
4. Pinch out the side shoots of tomatoes.
5. Harvest lettuce, radish, other salads and early potatoes.
6. Mow lawns at least once a week.
7. Plant out summer bedding.

Why? The clock was in need of urgent repair


When? Around 1869. The striking mechanism was added in 1876.

Global Warming And Us

What it means

We are all increasingly aware of the disastrous consequences should global warming continue at its present rate. Indeed, there is a World Summit to be held in Glasgow in November to try and work out a way forward.

What can we do?

We can help by: using less plastic; separating our waste; driving less; not burning any waste, even garden waste etc. We might be doing a lot now but could we be doing more?

Please read on:

One of the big causes of pollution is the way our electricity is produced from fossil fuels and oil.

We could stop this pollution going into the air and causing global warming by only using electricity which is produced by green, sustainable energy sources such as Solar, Wind and Wave power. The electricity from these sources **DOES NOT** create global warming and so **DOES NOT HARM** the planet.

A way forward

Last year the target of generating enough electricity to supply all the domestic consumption, by green sustainable energy, Solar, Wind and Waves, was achieved. Quite a landmark!

A leader in this field is Octopus Energy, an electricity supplier which was named 'Company of the year 2021' and the first energy supplier, to be 'Which' recommended 4 years in a row. This is because they produce only 100% electricity from green sources.

Three good reasons to switch your electricity supplier

1. Save money on your electricity bills (£60-£250 annually) and receive £50 off your first bill.
2. Help global warming by using only electricity from green sustainable sources: Solar, Wind & Waves.

Countryside Notes

Monday 17th May. A wet night has emerged again, what a change since the droughtiness of last month, however it doesn't warm up much. The rain was very welcome and has helped the late germinating seeds to establish. Grandson announced that he was in "Lamb Heaven" as the lambs ran races and skipped about in the evening air, whilst mothers ate their supplementary rations.

How good things in the garden, hedgerow and fields smell after having a good drink and a little bit of sunshine. I am always advocating the visionary things in nature to look out for. But our sense of smell is one of our treasures. Our predecessors were given a young Tree Peony that has grown into a fair-sized shrub; its flowers are single and dark red with a circle of yellow stamens, but its scent is exquisite. One or two in a vase will make a room smell super. We can't tell what variety it is, even after scouring Kew Gardens, we found colour and size but not the perfume. It is, however, the scent of the May blossom that usually reaches me before the tight flower-laden branches burst into their brilliant whiteness. For many years that scent, though not too appealing, has stirred me and reminded me that "summer is almost here". How quick a smell can be recognised, like polish in some old houses! In a flash we are back in grannie's house. Our ability to smell is very small indeed when we consider that some insects can smell certain plants a mile away, and fly to them. I once read that if our scenting pieces were laid flat, they would be not much bigger than a postage stamp, whereas a dog's would be the size of a man's handkerchief. However, we have much better colour vision, so we are told!

I haven't heard the Cuckoo yet this year, though there have been reports of odd ones about us. It is a sound that is getting scarcer as the years go by and there is much speculation as to why this should be. Also, the Swallow population seems to have taken a tumble. There are few on the farm this year and they were late in arriving. I have heard that a Swift has been seen in the village and by the time that you read this, hopefully many more will be about flying on their scimitar wings at great speed and filling the air with their screaming calls.

Last week, I was amused as a Robin tried to alight on a Dandelion clock but, of course, it collapsed, and the little bird stumbled and looked a bit startled!!

Our lawn is not the trim sight it should be because (a) the mower has been playing up, (b) I have been short of time, (c) wildflower meadows are all the rage at the moment, and (d) I am going to spray out the broad-leaved weeds. There's four good excuses! In the orchard and round the pond we have a few Milk Maids, Ladies Smock or whatever other name you have for them, but I will endeavour to cut round them and some of the wonderful Forget-me-nots that grow in patches of blue. Our early Honeysuckle is just bursting into flower, the yellow breaking through the red outer of the petals, and on a warm evening the smell will be a delight for us and for night flying moths and insects.

Enjoy this wonderful season of newness bursting forth all round us.

The River Foss Society

Did you know that the River Foss runs past Stillington Mill? It

begins near Crayke and joins the River Ouse around 28 miles later at Blue Bridge in York, the confluence of the two rivers being an important part of York's defences many years ago.

The River Foss Society is a friendly and enthusiastic group of people who are dedicated to its conservation and improvement all along its 28 or so miles. We get down and get dirty – litter picking and pulling up Himalayan balsam to help keep both problems under control, we even get into the river looking for water vole activity and are always looking for volunteers to get involved in these and other activities looking after the river.

We have a selection of walks planned over the coming months, and, once we return to 'normal' times, we will resume our varied programme of relevant visits, talks and outings. We check the river water for purity, we organise and join in with surveys to help understand and monitor its biodiversity. We are a point of contact for many of the organisations involved in the river's environment and are currently gathering data on the presence of mink, the water voles' number one enemy. Our members' newsletter is published four times a year listing forthcoming activities with reviews of those just completed, along with articles of general interest written by members.

Weather Report - May

Rainfall

Last year April was dry and sunny. This year it was even drier and even sunnier.

There were only three days with measurable rainfall. The total for the month was less than 5mm (average figure 37mm).

The dry spell which started on March 16th ended dramatically on May 3rd when we experienced 19mm (3/4 inch) in a day. By the 16th rainfall totalled 53mm, more than the average total for May.

Temperature

The highest temperature in April was 19.7°C on the 20th. May, so far, reached 18.1°C, on the 9th.

The lowest temperature in April, -1.7°C, occurred on the night of 12th/13th, one of nine unseasonably frosty nights in April. So far nights in May have been cool, but generally above zero. The lowest temperature was 0.8 °C on the night of 1st/2nd.

In 2020 the Met Office reported that nationally it had been the sunniest April on record. In 2021 we had a new record again. My solar panels generated 500kWh, certainly the best April figure and only exceeded in four months during the past five years.
