

#### Weather Report - November 2022

#### Rainfall

The second half of October had twice the rainfall of the first half, giving a total of 91mm for the month, nearly half as much again as the average.

November, likewise, has been wet. Three rainy days in the middle of the month gave us 36mm (nearly  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches). Is there still a hosepipe ban?

#### **Temperature**

The second half of October showed little change from the first half.

November, by contrast, has been remarkably mild so far. On the 11th I recorded 17.1°C, not far short of the record figure for November in the York area. The lowest temperature was 4.4°C on the night of 3rd/4th..

#### **Sunshine**

My solar panels gave me 240 kWh in October, the highest October figure since 2018.

### Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church

Every month the Eco-Working Group at St., Nicholas' Church gives a few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions, as an act of love for Christ's creation and our fellow human beings. For December, then:



#### **December - Christmas Crackers**

- 1. Real trees have a much lower carbon footprint than artificial ones, especially if disposed of by wood-chipping. An artificial tree would need to be reused for ten years to be comparable.
- 2. This Advent (i.e. this year from November 27th until Christmas Day), pray for grace and wisdom to play your part in caring for creation.
- 3. Watch your shopping trolley. In the UK our food spend increases by 16% in December; make sure you are not over catering and that extras are not going to end up in the bin.

#### **Countryside Notes**

I am writing this after a chilly day with poor light and afternoon rain. At last, we have water in the pond, enough for a pair of Mallards to swim in last night. The Foss has risen over the last few days, the first time since last winter, I think. This would indicate that the water table in the land has risen to nearer November levels. The autumn sown crops have grown well and developed good root systems that will help them survive more wet weather if it continues.

On Remembrance Day, whilst observing the two minutes silence, I was looking down on the short grass and was surprised at how many plants were growing there. All of them with their own particular shaped leaves, each species different in shape. This, so the botanists say, is for each to be better able to drink in the sunshine.

While at the church, I will draw your attention to the wall at the east gate from Main Street. There are shale stones built in the wall that I think will be local stone, as this type of shale is in the area. If you look carefully, you will see that there are an awful lot of Fossils within them. Some Mussel-like ones that some call Devil's Toenails, some have finer flat scallop-shaped shells. How many of us have never noticed these intriguing prehistoric beings from long, long past? It was only last year that I noticed them. Similar fossil encrusted shale has been found when Marl Ponds were dug to the south of the village. I guess that these creatures lived in mud which would suggest that the area was once flooded. Marl is clay that was used to stabilise the light sandy land and prevent erosion. That is why there are so many small ponds in the sandy areas where it was dug by hand and then spread on the land. Modern marling is done with machines that dig vast holes that are then used as irrigation reservoirs.

Last month I was objecting to the damage being done by badgers rooting up grass in the fields. This is still going on and now, with the wet, the digging has got easier. Now, Mr and Mrs Mole have decided that our lawn grass needs decorating with molehills, not a good idea! A pressing job for me to begin is the gathering of Holly for Christmas before the Blackbirds have similar thoughts, then I must put the gathered berries where the mice will not devour them like last year!

Enjoy Christmas and walk off the excess of indulgence by enjoying the colours of winter and blue skies. R & M

#### **Advent Conversations**

Having recently taken up the role of Methodist minister with the **Villages Together Methodist Church**, I'm pleased to have this opportunity to share some thoughts as we move into the season of Advent and prepare for Christmas.

You may be familiar with the radio programme *Across the Red Line*, so-called because it encourages participants to look beyond the set red lines of their social and political views in order to appreciate alternative stances. Two people with differing outlooks are brought together to explore a particular question. The conversation then moves through three distinct phases. In the first part the two participants are given the opportunity to state their own convictions. Together they begin a debate which focuses primarily on the arguments they wish to use to support their point of view. In the second part they are asked to move away from presenting and defending their own angle. Instead they ask open questions of each other and try to understand what it is that has brought them to their current beliefs and values. It is here that much more attention is given to listening, not to the arguments, but to one another. In the third part they are then asked to put themselves in each other's shoes and summarise how the other feels and thinks about the question at hand.

The process moves from debate to inquiry to understanding. From promoting and defending a point of view to taking a deeper interest in the other participant and then on again to articulating the stance of the other to check that it has been understood accurately. The process challenges those taking part to enter into a relationship where alternative views are recognised and understood and where each learns a little at least about the other.

Perhaps this might provide us with a framework for our travelling through Advent. Traditionally understood as a season for self-examination and reflection, Advent invites us to do this through encountering and appreciating what may feel very different and strange. A deeper valuing of others may well result in a deeper valuing of ourselves.

You might like to make a conscious effort to make conversation this Advent. It will make a difference!
