STILLINGTON VILLAGE HALL is run on behalf of the local community by a small group of volunteers. It is a registered charity no. 1076571, so the committee members are Trustees of the charity. We have a Chair, Treasurer, Secretary, Bookings Secretary and Health & Safety rep.

The hall is used by village groups for meetings, activities and entertainment. It is also available for outside bookings, parties, events and commercial activities.

The committee also organises fund-raising events like the Christmas Fair, Book Sales and theatre/music events, to help with running costs.

We are really wanting to encourage new faces to join the committee with bright ideas and a fresh perspective. Anyone with IT skills, experience in social media, ability to organise and promote arts events and a general desire to enhance village life would be most welcome – gardeners and maintenance people are needed too. Some of us are getting a little tired and personally, I have been booking and promoting Rural Arts, independent theatre groups, music, fashion shows, craft experiences and other random events for more than 10 years now. Countryside Notes January 2022

Monday 13th December and it is a mild night with gentle rain falling. Last week saw two golden moments: the first being as I was driving from Sutton to York, when I noticed a lot of smallish birds flying in a tight flock of perhaps 500 - 600, maybe more. Their flight pattern, fast wing beats with a slightly curved shaped wing told me they were Waders. Then they turned and flew over my vehicle, where I was sure that they were Golden Plover. Birds that flock in winter, after summering on higher and more northerly rough upland ground. These birds are one of the fastest flying birds. Odd ones or small groups will dwell in winter with the Green Plover or Peewit, their call notes often tell you they are there. The gold on the upper parts of the bird is stunning if you are fortunate enough to see them in good sunlight, a sight you will never forget. Now, the Green Plover is usually seen as black and white, until you see them in sunlight where their iridescent colours shine out, bright green, purple, black and white with buff under tail feathers and a fine crested head. I remember seeing one such when harrowing land in spring as a very young farmer. I have never forgotten for the tractor allowed me fairly close viewing, and we looked out for the scrape of a nest with four mottled eggs, with their pointy ends in the centre. We would stop the tractor, with birds objecting and move the nest out of the way of the harrow, where the birds could settle down again. Modern, big farm machinery moving fast can't do that.

The other golden moment was on Friday last week when I had stopped for a sandwich while moving sheep fencing. The sun was shining on my left when suddenly a little bird flew and alighted on some willow 20 feet (7 metres) away. Immediately, I recognised it by its golden yellow on the wings and the more golden forehead stripe or crest. I quietly said "hello and welcome" and it, as quickly, said "Goodbye". It was a treat to see this, one of our smallest birds, even smaller than Jenny Wren. The Goldcrest is a bird of the garden and shrub beds that keeps itself to itself and may be more numerous than we think.

What will 2022 bring us? Many surprises I guess, and I hope that they will be good. One thing is certain, the seasons will come and go, in all their glory for us to enjoy. Here's to a superb year for all of you. **R&M**

Weather Report - December 2021

Rainfall

Until the 26th of the month, it was looking to be the driest November since I started keeping records, fifteen years ago. Then we had 25.5mm (1 inch) of precipitation in 24 hours. The contribution in the small hours of the 27th was in the form of snow. The monthly total therefore came to 41mm, compared with an average figure of 68mm.

The first two weeks of December have been relatively dry, 20mm to date.

Temperature

The first three weeks of November were relatively mild, the daytime temperature getting above 15°C on both the 9th and 18th of the month. In the last ten days of the month winter really set in, with frequent frosts as well as the snow mentioned above. The lowest temperature I recorded was -1.2°C, on the night of 28th/29th. It did mean that the snow hung around for several days.

So far December has been mainly cold and windy, but with an occasional mild day to confuse us, 12.6°C on Sunday 12th, for example. Overnight, 0.2°C on the 6th/7th, has been the lowest.

During November, with the days short and the sun low, the solar panels generated a meagre 120kWh, which was slightly more than in recent Novembers.

Work on the electrical system in the bus shelter was agreed and an electrician would be engaged to do the work.
