## Newspaper Sorters And Deliverers Required

As many satisfied customers already know, Stillington shop has a proud tradition of opening early every day (except Sunday) to sort each day's consignment of newspapers and get them ready for delivery to homes around the village. The service relies on adult volunteers to do the sorting, and school children to make the deliveries (for which they get paid).

**Paper deliverers** can be any age between 13 and 15. You can join our reserve list now to cover rounds when any of our regular deliverers are away, and be first in line when a regular round becomes available. In term time, that means collecting your papers between 7am and 7.15am for a round that takes about 30 minutes. A bit later in the holidays.

**Paper sorters** are volunteers who open the shop for 6.30am, get the papers arranged for each delivery round, and generally greet early village risers and passers-by as the day begins - just once a week, or even once a fortnight.

A reminder about the type of scams seen in North Yorkshire: • about energy refunds/assistance. The reduction in your energy bills comes directly from the supplier and you do not have to apply for it.

• 'WhatsApp scam', the victim receives a message purporting to be from son/daughter saying they have lost their phone and they have an urgent bill to pay. Should you receive such a message, it is invariably a scam.

• Remember, the police or bank will **NEVER** ask you to move money to a 'safe' account and if you are ever told to lie to the bank/police/family etc as to why you are sending/moving money, it is a scam

• Thieves are stealing phones and bank cards together, so that they can steal your money online; beware keeping your bank card and phone together in your bag or wallet

## Stillington and Farlington WI

Due to a mix-up with dates our advertised speaker was unable to attend the meeting on Wednesday 14th September, but we were very pleased to welcome Barbara Boyce who, at very short notice, agreed to visit and tell us all about her 'Year in Chains'!

Barbara was Lord Mayor of York from 2017-2018. The Lord Mayor is the Chairman of the City of York Council and the appointment is made each year in May. York's Lord Mayor is second only to the Lord Mayor of London in precedence.

Barbara's title was Lord Mayor - not Lady Mayor or Mayoress. From the 1200's to 1940 all the mayors had been men, then in 1941 Edna Crichton was appointed as the first female Lord Mayor. There have been 15 women in total.

The Mansion House is the official residence of the Lord Mayor. Originally they inhabited the whole house with staff, but now accommodation is at the top of the house while the rest of the building is a museum and coffee shop, open to the public.

The mayoral chain of office that Barbara wore is a replica made in the 1950's from silver-gilt. The original is on display in the Mansion House. It was donated in 1612 and is thought to be Dutch in origin. There is a portrait in St. Crux Church dated 1612 where the subject appears to be wearing the chain. Sheffield assay office has examined the original and found it to be pure gold.

Various ceremonies were attended by Barbara during her year including religious events in the Jewish, Muslim and Hare Krishna faiths; citizenship ceremonies, military events and local business and charity functions. She had a very busy year!

Please may I remind you that the October and November meetings are craft based - a Christmas card in October and sugar paste in November - the speakers will be bringing all the necessary materials. ### Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church



A few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions, as an act of love for Christ's creation and our fellow human beings. For October, then:

**At the shops:** Think before you buy: gold does not always glitter brightly.

A new £500 gold necklace has a carbon emissions tag of 400kg CO<sub>2</sub>e: the mining process damages landscapes, ecosystems and contaminates water, and can be associated with human rights violations.

**What's on the menu?** Think about your food before it reaches your table. 45% of the carbon emissions from food comes from production (on the farm), 28% in food processing, 7% in packaging and 19% from transport. Home grown has the lowest carbon footprint.

**Around the home:** If in doubt switch to off: it is never more efficient to leave appliances running when you are not using them. Switch everything off at the plug before you go out and before you go to bed.

### Avenue of Trees

A proposal to plant an avenue of trees on Easingwold Road could not go ahead due to buried services.

### Public Session

Matters discussed were the horse chestnut tree near the village hall, the Jubilee fund, contractors driving whilst on mobile phones and abandoned dog poo bags on Mill Lane.

### North Back Lane

A meeting had been requested with the Surgery regarding the damage being caused by vehicles having to drive on the verges due to parked cars. A reply is still awaited.

### Policies

A set of twenty new draft policies has been produced and a review of these, by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman is ongoing.

### Village Maintenance

The footway on the South of Main Street needs repairing and is a hazard to wheelchair users. Fissures have appeared in the carriageway of York Road on the village side of the 30mph speed sign. Weeds are growing through the newly resurfaced Skeugh Lane. All these matters to be reported to NYCC Highways.

### Weather Report - August 2022

#### Rainfall

The second half of August was nearly as dry as the first half, so the monthly total, of 14mm, was the lowest I have ever recorded for the month. Usually August is the wettest month, with an average rainfall of 78mm. No wonder there is a water shortage.

So far, September has given us 34mm in the first sixteen days, well up to average.

#### Temperature

The heatwaves of July and August now seem a distant memory. The highest we have had in September is 24.1°C and by halfway through the month maximum daytime temperatures are in the teens

Nights are getting cooler too, with a minimum of 8.7°C on the 15th/16th.

Sunshine in August gave me 480kWh of solar energy, higher than usual for August, but not exceptional.

## Countryside Notes

Tuesday 20th September, another fine day with a mixture of cloud and sunshine and ever shortening days. The welcome rain of ten days ago perked everything up, even the lawn needs mowing again. However, the sun shone and a stiff westerly wind blew last Friday taking a lot of the moisture back up again and browning the tender green grass in the field, which the sheep were enjoying.

Of course, yesterday was the funeral for our wonderful Queen and we, like many more, watched our TVs with sadness but with a sense of awe and wonder at the precision pageantry of the occasion and the feeling of thankfulness that we are Brits. When the cortege arrived at Westminster Abbey, I noticed a beautiful Grey Wagtail on the path outside our French Window, resplendent in his new winter plumage: yellow throat and belly, black wings with white edges to some feathers and slate blue upper parts with a white eye stripe. It seemed so appropriate that such a turnout could come naturally, unlike the polished boots, brass buttons and all the finery of the military might.

You may have noticed that there have been fewer careless Pheasants on our roadsides this autumn. Because of the Bird Flu restrictions, the Pheasant Hatchery businesses have been unable to rear as many poults that would have been released in the countryside this autumn. However, there seem to have been more careless Badgers out at night judging by the number of roadside corpses.

Talking to a neighbour yesterday who had been watching six hares chasing in a stubble field expressed his surprise that a young one had run up very close before seeing him. I was able to tell him that the eyes on a hare are set in the head so they can see any pursuing danger coming up behind and that this one was running looking back instead of forwards.

Along our grass verges there are a number of bright yellow flowers that catch the eye; however, I have not had or made the time to stop and really identify them fully, but one of the commonest is the Sowthistle growing tall, with flowers on top giving way to light air borne seed.

The Acorns are falling and the sheep are eating them. They are a good size this year, the oak along with many other trees have heavy loads of seed. Soon we will see the autumn colours again, enjoy them as they come.

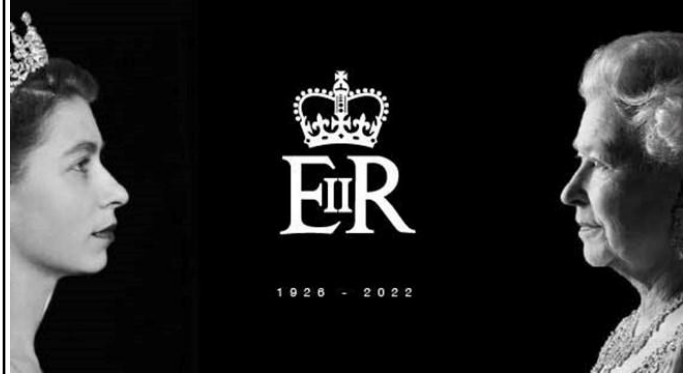

My way of dealing with these (and the Covid pandemic we have just lived through) is to have faith in God that he will rescue us. The Bible has lots of situations where God came to the rescue, such as when the Israelites who were slaves to the Pharaohs in Egypt fled through a miraculous opening of the Red Sea and amazing adventures in the desert. In the serious situations we are currently facing I put my trust in God to rescue us. This helps me to enjoy the present time and find peace of mind for the future. Why don't you try it?

## In Memoriam



HM Queen Elizabeth II died at Balmoral Castle on Thursday 8th September aged 96. There followed ten days of national mourning with her coffin carried by car to Edinburgh to lay in state at the Cathedral until being flown to London for lying in state at Westminster Hall. It would lay there until 6.30am on Monday 19th September – the day of her state funeral at Westminster Abbey and then onwards to St George's Chapel at Windsor Castle.

Here in Stillington there was a short service in St Nicholas Church on Friday evening, 9th September and over 120 people stood outside the Church on Sunday evening, 18th September for the one minute National Moment of Reflection.
