Stillington Bonfire And Fireworks 2024

As the sun dipped below the horizon, the village buzzed with excitement for the evening's festivities. - 5. Take hardwood cuttings

Good turn outs for both November walks.

Scackleton start on 11th Nov. with a route criss-crossing other walks: via Scackleton Grange, Swathgill, crossing Coulton, down to the springs near Hovingham Lodge & back to base up Scackleton Lane.

A 2° crisp, clear day for 23rd Nov. walk from Husthwaite: starting through the village gardens; down to *Orchards of Husthwaite*, cider makers base and The Hideaway at Baxby Manor with its glamping variations. Husthwaite has been known as the 'Orchard Village' since the early 17th Century with fruit shipped all over the north east of England. *Orchards of Husthwaite* was formed in 2009 to replant the vanishing orchards and use the fruit to make and sell a variety of products including ciders and juices. The walk skirted Thormanby and then north to Carlton Husthwaite and return via Robson Tractors and Baxby Manor Airfield.

Stillington Parish Council - November Meeting

The Council meeting was on Wednesday 6th October 2024 in the Village Hall with Cllrs Tim Drew (Chairman), Graham Taylor, Robert Churton, Richard Smyth, Tim Milburn, Christine Cookman and Tracy Sinclair together with 2 members of the public. Apologies were received from North Yorkshire Cllr Malcolm Taylor.

Public Session

Matters raised were EC charging, South Back Lane rat infestation and defibrillator servicing.

North Yorkshire Councillor's Report

Cllr Taylor reported that the planning application on Easingwold Road has been deferred pending three items of further information.

Bus Shelter

The bus shelter has been vandalised and an initial temporary repair to the glass been made together with a full repair. The Police have caught the perpetrators and financial restitution is being sought.

Grass cutting

The Chairman will negotiate the new grass cutting schedule with the contractor. A wildflower policy working group to be formed to advise on a future strategy.

EV Charging

It was agreed that due to limited parking at the village hall the installation of an EV charger will not be pursued.

Dog Waste Bin

A dog waste bin for Mill Lane to be requested.

Next Meeting

Wildflower policy, budget setting and Precept setting to be added to the next agenda. Meeting to be held on Wednesday 4th December 2024 in the Village Hall at 7pm.

Countryside Notes

Tuesday, 19th November A big change in the weather, a covering of snow this morning after a frost and a hoar frost the previous night. We have not become accustomed to feeling cold!! The sheep saw it coming, eating a lot on Sunday afternoon, doing what I call "Packing"; if you can fill them, then they will cope when the bad weather comes, a good shepherd sees the signs and prepares.

I have said that I would write about the Ash Tree this month as we have lost so many in the Stripe or strips around Home Farm Park. The silviculturists of decades ago referred to it as the "Venus of the Woods" on account of its gracefulness when given the opportunity to spread its branches, to catch as much sunshine as possible. The tree is usually one of the last to put its leaves up, and one of the first to shed them in the autumn. The leaves break forth after the tree has flowered in the spring. The flowers are not very inspiring, being like a black cinder that opens to reveal the yellow pistil and the stamens of a dark purple, in due time the Ash Keys will form like a bunch of keys. Each key is an elongated shiny seed, each with a slight twist, so, when ripe, they can travel, twisting in the breeze. The seed being in the base of the key, is weighted to give it power to bury itself and perpetuate another ash tree. The ash tree is fairly fast growing and, if grown near other ash trees, will grow However, the isolated ones branch out to give charm to all.

The ash's lifespan is about 200 years, so it is not a long-lived tree, the venerable old trees' timber is often not of consistent dense wood and, often, lightning has made its mark. So, good ash timber, which is fairly durable but not too heavy, is taken from younger trees that, through working their way up, have grown towards the light, straight and supple.

Rooks and Crows like to nest high in these trees, where they have good visibility because the leaf canopy is not as dense as some other trees, also they like the thick ash twigs for the structural foundation for their nests. Ash dieback is here and we hope that the ash will not share the same fate as the wonderful Elm.

Have a good Christmas and enjoy the countryside around you.

Disturbing the Peace – A Traumatic Story

It will not be unusual if this Advent you receive Christmas cards proclaiming "Peace" in words and images which evoke tranquillity, harmony, creativity and stillness. Yet the way in which Matthew gives us the story of Jesus' birth is shot through with trauma. Joseph struggles with the shame of his fiancee's pregnancy and sees this only as the end of their relationship, not the beginning. Herod is perturbed by the threat of an alternative monarch and perceives that the only way to ensure peace and control is through violence. Those who manage to get away find themselves searching for asylum in frighteningly strange places. And all of this while travellers from some distance come and go, leaving their mark by unwittingly and unwisely alerting the current king to the birth of a possible rival, by offering extravagant and thought-provoking gifts, and then clearing off home safe and sound, untouched by the instability raging around Jerusalem and Bethlehem.

The first two chapters of Matthew's Gospel are, of course, a prologue, and as such they encapsulate for us the significant themes of the whole book. Chief among these is the tussle between the values of God's kingdom and the values of Herod's and Caesar's kingdom – the tussle between seeking peace and justice through non-violence and seeking peace through violent control and oppression. Violence and victims are not simply to be found in the story of the massacring of innocent young children, but occur on a number of other occasions too.

Perhaps the question that lies before us this Advent as we engage with Matthew's story is whether we wish to sail through the narrative in the way that the wise men do, coming and then going, bringing their gifts and then returning to the relative safety of their homeland, or whether we are prepared to take seriously the depth of the text in all its trauma, recognising that it poses for us the choice between God's values of trust, hope, vulnerability and community and Herod's values of fear, control, power and isolation.

You might like to take time over the next few weeks to see the story from alternative perspectives, perhaps not only those of the main characters, but also those that remain unmentioned or unnamed: Mary's parents, Joseph's best friend, a soldier ordered to kill a baby, a mother hiding her infant....

And then ask yourself how this may have deepened your understanding of contexts such as Gaza, Israel and Lebanon.
