# Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church

Every month the Eco-Working Group at St Nicholas' Church gives a few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions.

**February:** Get to grips with your bills

Energy bills: The information on a typical energy bill can be confusing, but understanding it can go a long way to helping you get to grips with your energy use.

Switch your electricity supplier so that you support renewable electricity generation rather than electricity made by burning fossil fuels. Try the Green Journey price comparison site greenjourney.switchgasandelectric. com

More than half the money spent on fuel bills goes towards providing heating and hot water. Installing a room thermostat, a programmer, thermostatic radiator valves and using them efficiently could save you around £75 a year.

If you already have a full set of heating controls, turning down your room thermostat by just one degree can save £80 a year.

# Huby, Stillington & Sheriff Hutton Newsletter February 2025

The few days we spent in Aquae Sulis, the Roman name for the city of Bath, turned out to be a fascinating time of discovery. Bath's history largely focuses on two particular phases: the Romans in the first four centuries, the centrepiece of this being the extensive Roman baths, and the Georgian period of the 18th century, with its innovative architecture reaching the heights of the Royal Crescent, sometimes used as the background to period dramas on our television screens. The natural hot springs, and their supposed healing properties, drew both the Romans and the Georgians. One visit was to a museum on the Royal Crescent, set out as a typical 18th century house. In addition to all the period pieces of furniture and furnishings we were encouraged to think about image and 18th century selfies. We know how popular it is these days for people to take photos of themselves and to post these pictures on social media for others to see. The same kind of focus on image was just as true three hundred years ago, particularly among the wealthy, as portraits. What the exhibition invited us to do was to look carefully at a series of portraits and to ask ourselves how these individuals were wanting to be seen: what was the significance of their clothing, the background, whether they were sitting or standing, who else might be in the painting ... and then came the question of what was missing – what had been airbrushed out by the artist! How do we see ourselves? How are we seen by others? These are questions which go to the heart of our identity, of who we are, of how we understand ourselves, of how we value ourselves, of how we are honest with ourselves: They are ultimately questions of truth. Why is this so important? Because how we see and understand ourselves has a significant impact on how we see. understand and relate to others.

It was a clear day for the Oulston walk on 16 December, west past Manor Farm to Thornton Lane and return via the Foss. Walk along the extended Thornton Lodge site, River Kyle and the new development of Low Buildings.

On 30 December, the walk from

Aldwark headed east to the rear of Aldwark Manor and through Hall Moor woodland; then north over to Straight Lane past the Rising Sun Farm and Haddocks Plantation, returning via Rice Lane.
Lying snow and fallen timber from December's Storm Darrugh faced 13 walkers on 13 January walking the northern edge of Rievaulx Moor from Newgate roadside and return via Newbiggin Bank: all worth the effort.

### **Countryside Notes**

Sunday 19th January brought a dreary and chilly day, with most of the yard's ice melted. As the saying goes, 'As the days begin to lengthen, so the cold begins to strengthen.' With the cold snap arriving alongside the new moon,



it's a sign the chill may linger. We've not faced such a cold spell in years, and the wildlife has reacted accordingly. Birds are feeding

eagerly—long-tailed tits visit regularly, and a male greater spotted woodpecker, distinguished by the red nape on his neck, has been busy at the nuts. Pheasants and red-legged partridges have discovered the corn in the buildings, appearing daily for breakfast. The french partridges, shy breeders, rarely rear more

than three chicks annually, though they've been around the farmstead for years. Meanwhile, grey squirrels, anticipating the cold, have built drevs in the tall hedges. These round nests of twigs and leaves resemble smaller, less thorny magpie nests. While entertaining to watch as they perform acrobatics in the trees, their numbers should be controlled, as they can be a threat to bird nests. On 3rd January, I was delighted to gather a posy of snowdrops. Though they don't last long in water, they spark the hope of spring. Around the same time, an orange japonica flower bloomed, and a white camellia was bursting forth—both out of season. I trust nature will soon restore its rhythm. Those who missed the sunsets leading up to Christmas missed a spectacle, especially on Christmas Eve. The sky brimmed with colour, filling half the horizon. Returning from Malton, I was lucky to witness it and see photographers capturing the moment. It reminded me of people travelling to Scandinavia to glimpse the Northern Lights at great expense, while such beauty was available here, free of charge. Different phenomena, yes, but the natural world offers much to marvel at throughout the year. Last year, I found the complete skin of a dragonfly larva on an iris stalk - a reminder of nature's transformations - from nymph to exquisite dragonfly. So, keep your eyes open for the remarkable in your daily rounds.

On Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> February our guest speaker will be Martin Walker. His topic is **Gardening Grumbles**; this sounds very interesting.

#### **AGM**

The 2025 AGM will be held on 30<sup>th</sup> April. The AGM starts at 7.15pm which will be followed by our Speaker at 7.30pm.

#### 2025 Plant Sale

This will be held on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> May. It will follow the very successful format of previous years except it will be held in the Village Hall. Plants will be displayed on tables. And, oh yes there will be coffee, tea and cream scones!!

### Spring is in sight

This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. Plenty to do indoors this month to prepare for the season ahead. Outdoors, as the garden comes to life again, it's time to prune shrubs and climbers, such as *Wisteria* as well as evergreen hedges.

### Top gardening jobs this month

Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover.

Knowing which vegetables to sow where, when and how means you can maintain constant supplies throughout the season.

Sow vegetable seeds and chit potato tubers

It's important with earlies, and a good idea with maincrops, to chit the seed potatoes before planting. This means allowing them to start sprouting shoots.

Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches from frost.

## **Top Tips for this month**

- -Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- -Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- -Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'
- -Prune Wisteria
- -Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- -Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea
- -Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses
