However, due to a combination of long-term illness, holidays and difficulty obtaining trained temporary staff to cover, for the next few months, it is likely that dispensing some prescriptions will take the full five working days. **Please support our Surgery staff and avoid your own inconvenience by getting your prescription requests in well in advance.**



Village Pond Update

There have been various comments made about the work on the Village Pond on the village Facebook page. Information about the work has been reported in the Parish Council Minutes and the Stillington Newsletter. Some history and an update on the work might be useful to readers.

The pond was last fully dredged in 1991. Following a survey and report in 2020, volunteers manually raked out accumulated leaf debris and organic matter in both Sept 2020 and 2022 with limited success. Dredging was then planned late summer 2023 but thwarted by high rainfall and similarly in 2024. Following recommendations of the report, overhanging tree branches have been cut back to reduce leaf litter and allow more light on the water; it also advised the number of wild fowl should be managed to minimise waste from their droppings. The pond is fed by water run-off and piped from the road and one drain from a neighbour's land; there is no spring; there do seem to be leaks as the water level soon drops in dry weather. The timing for dredging this year was not ideal, work needed to be done, and the cost was escalating each year. The pond water was stagnant and lacked any pond life. This was confirmed when the pond water was removed. The material was deposited to the rear of the pond and away from any water course. A total of around 170 tons was removed. During this time care was taken over the geese and the other wildlife. They were fed and watered on a daily basis and they all stayed around the pond in spite of the machinery. The island was removed and has been rebuilt with new stone. Some of the yellow flag iris plants have been replanted and the surrounding area will be tidied, grassed and woodland wildflowers will be sown.

By the time you read this, more water should have been delivered, and the pond should be returning to normal with long-expected rainfall.

Thank you to all those living near the pond for putting up with the noise and any disruption.

Are there more wildflowers in our spare churchyard this year?

At St Nicholas' Church we are trying to increase the number and variety of wildflowers in the 'spare' churchyard. This is the field to the east of the churchyard on North Back Lane. It is consecrated land that will, in a few years' time, be used for burials. So meanwhile, we are trying to create a flower meadow for all of us to enjoy and encourage butterflies, insects, birds etc. We are encouraging more wildflowers naturally by only cutting the field once a year in August, once the flowers have set their seeds. We then remove the cuttings, as surprisingly wildflowers grow best where the land is poor. We have also been sowing wildflower seeds and planting young plants that we have grown, such as red campion, oxeye daisy and yellow rattle (thanks to Liz Cole). But what progress are we making? In June each year we have been surveying the plants and wildlife in the field. **Come and help us survey the field on Saturday 7th June 10.00am to 12 noon. Meet at the field, wear suitable clothing and stout footwear. We will give you help to identify the plants, butterflies etc. Children must be accompanied by an adult.** Thank you for your help in advance. More information Margaret Price 01347 811262



Stillington Parish Council

The Council meeting was on Wednesday 7th April 2025 in the Village Hall with Cllrs Richard Smyth (Chairman), Tracy Sinclair, Christine Cookman, Graham Taylor, Robert Churton and John Pollock together with 4 members of the public. The Council were pleased to co-opt Cllr John Pollock on to the Council. One vacancy still remains; an expression of interest was given by a member of the public at the meeting. This would be followed up at the next meeting.

Election of Chairman - Cllr Smyth was elected as Chairman for the coming year.

Election of Vice-Chairman - Cllr Sinclair was elected as Vice-Chairman for the coming year.

Public Session - Matters raised were the pond, boundary commission and the pot holes on South Back Lane.

North Yorkshire Councillor's Report - Cllr Taylor had reported that had reported that the boundary review was recommending Stillington be moved out of the current division into Hillside division for the next elections.

Memorial Plaque - A memorial plaque had been fitted to the old bus shelter to explain its historical significance.

Village Pond - The work to the pond was nearly completed. 170 tonnes of slurry had been removed. The fencing would be made geese-proof. Grass seed will be planted on the removed slurry. Foxes had raided the moor hen's nest. Duck eggs had been found and were in an incubator and the ducklings would be returned to the pond. A lifebuoy is required. A letter from a resident had been received regarding the process and this would be replied to.

VE Celebrations - The VE day celebrations held on Monday 5th May 2025 had been a great success.

Next Meeting - Will be held on Wednesday 2nd July 2025 in the Village Hall at 7.00pm. The meeting closed at 9.00pm.

Countryside Notes

Thursday 15th May

A cloudy day with a cool wind blowing for most of it. Thankfully, no rain is forecast for at least a week. The land is parched from the drying winds and strong sunshine, which has slowed spring growth—nettles in the fields are only half their usual height. Still, the lambs enjoy their evening races, kicking up clouds of dust. I wish I had their energy! We've been watching a pair of Blackbirds nesting. They successfully hatched chicks, but sadly, something found the nest and destroyed the young. The parents, undeterred, are building again. Magpies, Carrion Crows, and Jackdaws are everywhere, always hungry. Worst are the crows, which will attack a weak lamb—taking its eyes and tongue—leaving us with a grim task. On a brighter note, the Swallows are back, though later than usual, no doubt trying to make up time before they return to Africa. The lawn by the house is alive with birds hunting insects. Pied Wagtails (one tailless, sadly), a beautiful pair of Goldfinches—always a favourite with their red faces and golden wings—and other small visitors. Long ago, cottagers caged Goldfinches, but now they grace our gardens freely. In the back field, we've seen non-breeding Green Plovers (Peewits), but the real treat is a pair of Oystercatchers. Their black-and-white plumage and orange beaks are striking. One morning, the male performed a lovely courtship dance—trembling wing feathers and graceful flight—accompanied by their distinctive piping call. Last Sunday, near Newburgh Pond, we spotted a group of male Goosanders diving for fish. It made me wonder if, like Eider drakes, they leave the parenting to the females. The roadside verges are a delight. Though the Dandelions have passed their peak, Cow Parsley (Queen Anne's Lace), Red Campion, and others brighten the hedgerows. Spring butterflies are out in force: Brimstones with their sulphur yellow, along with Holly Blues, Orange Tips, Commas, and Tortoiseshells. After a run of poor summers, we're hopeful for a better season for the summer butterflies. Take the time to notice these small wonders and enjoy all that nature offers.
